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DR. TUCK GIVES TIPS ON SYMPTOMS OF SCARLET FEVER

Dr. R. G. Tuck, Deputy Director, Oakland County Health Department, stated this week the parents should be aware of the symptoms of scarlet fever so that they can recognize it.

Dr. Tuck stated that scarlet fever is caused by a germ known as streptococcus and preceded by a very marked inflammation of the throat. It is the customary thing for the child to have a temperature and symptoms of a cold during the first stages.

Parents are asked to call their family physician at the first symptoms. Dr. Tuck stated that he will have drugs with which to treat the condition and prevent complications such as rheumatic fever, heart disease, mastoiditis or pneumonia. The child should be kept in bed until the physician arrives. Dr. Tuck urges parents not to get excited.

Scarletina is but a mild form of scarlet fever and is caused by the same organism, Dr. Tuck stated. If properly treated scarlet fever is not as serious as it was previously because of the introduction of new drugs to prevent complications.
