St. Patrick's Day Is March 17th

Who has the British name of Sicut? Who was captured by the pirates at the age of sixteen? Of course you know! It was Saint Patrick, whose feast day is celebrated throughout the world on March 17.

Saint Patrick had a romantic life, full of adventure. Yes, he was captured by the pirates from Ireland when he was only sixteen years old. He was taken back there and was set to tending the flocks of Ulster Chieftain. Since his six long years of tending made him a devoted Christian, he escaped to France and became a monk.

In 1432, something persuaded him to leave for Ireland as a missionary. Saint Patrick became so successful in everything he did he was known as one who "found Ireland all heathen and left it all Christian." Did you know that over three hundred churches were founded by St. Patrick and more than 120,000 people were baptized?

A great number of relics of this Saint were held sacred for many years, but some of them were destroyed during the Reformation. There is a four sided iron bell, said to be his, in the Museum of Arts and Sciences in Dublin. Much study has been given to Saint Patrick, but little that goes beyond the testimony of his own writings can be accepted. So when March 17 comes rolling around, let's not just think of it and then pass it by.

In the past few years these questions have been debated all over the country in high schools, colleges, on TV and radio programs. Why? Have the American people lost faith in themselves? Are they afraid to live under our free system? Do they want government control? The free American system has made America great! If we had never faced our free competitive business system, we would never have the great industrial system of now. If we had never had the American people we would never have the unity of labor. If we had never had this unity we would never have won the First and Second World Wars. For it was only the unity and will of the American people that caused us to win. The unity and will of a free people, and the people who were not under a welfare state, a conscription system, a U. M. I. system or a government stabilized system.

Are we to lose this unity and will? Not if the American people refuse these systems. Not if the American people will do their best in this Korean Police Action. Not if the American people will stand up to the fact that we are in danger of another war and do their best in civilian defense, in blood donating, industrial work and buying bonds, and believing and investing in our free government. So do your best under our free system now, for if you don't there may have to be an adoption of one of these unwanted systems.

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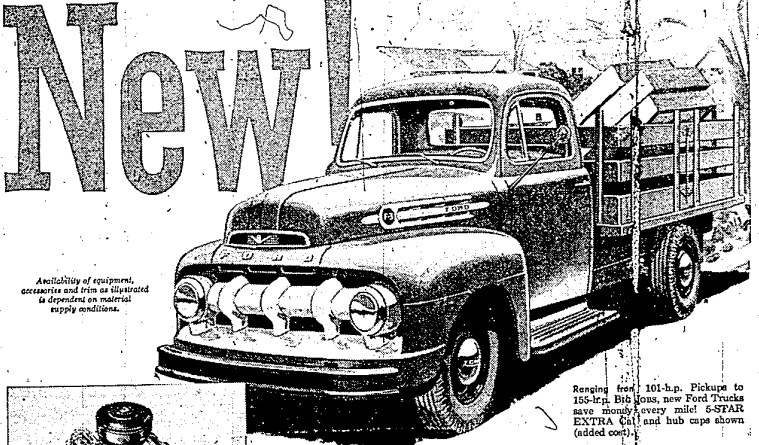
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
