Overheated Iron Will Damage Rayon

There are times in life when we do not strike when the iron is hot. One of those times is when we iron rayons, says a Michigan State College clothing specialist.

On a rayon blouse or slip the fusing together of two ribbons or the shiny patches around buttons and shoulder seams are sure indications that the iron was too hot, reports Josephine Martin of the textiles, clothing and related arts department at MSC.

All rayons must be given cool-iron treatment, she says, but special care should be taken with acetate rayon that tends to wilt and shine more readily than another common rayon, viscose. The trouble is, there is no real means of identifying acetate or viscose from the fabric itself unless the garment is labeled.

So best be safe with a cool iron for all rayons. By "cool" she means 300 degrees or less.
