eral government, which is up approximately \$2,000; police department, \$30,550, up approximately \$10,000, however, notice revenue are up about \$11,000; fire department, \$5,350, up about \$1,400, and public works, \$41,550, up approximately \$2,000. Payment stated that capital outlay includes new sewers, \$7,000; general new equipment, \$3,000; contingent fund, earmarked for purchase of new fire truck, \$2,000; and fire hall alteration, landscaping, \$1,500.

Mrs. Eino Teppo, 23324 Liberty Street, appeared before the Council to protest the location on lot of a new house under construction next to her residence. According to Mrs. Teppo, the house is forward of the other houses on the street and also on a higher grade. Mayor Kenn Loomis stated that the house is in accordance with the provisions of the ordinance, even though it does not conform to the existing line. The question of grade and a possible change in the zoning ordinance was turned over to Paul Pare, City Attorney, for study.

Two residents of the Floral Park section appeared before the Council to see what action might be taken to close Elm Street. The center of the street is the dividing line between the City and the Township. The street is dead-end at the present time and is not maintained. The Council stated that they would investigate the question and see what action could be taken.

WORK BEGINS ON LITTLE LEAGUE BASEBALL FIELD

Work has begun on the construction of a new baseball field in the Farmington City Park for use by the "Little League Baseball League." It was announced this week.

The field is being built in the northeast corner of the park and is expected to be ready for use later this spring. The sod is being removed from the infield and the entire field will be leveled. Base paths will be set out in accordance with "Little League" regulations. Plans also call for the erection of a fence along the river which will be the outfield boundary.

Try-outs for the four teams in the Farmington "Little League" will begin next month. Team coaches have been selected and practice dates and locations will be sent out to boys from eight to twelve years old through the Farmington schools.

Area Firemen Answer Grass Fire Alarms

Farmington City and Township firemen answered 23 fire alarms, 21 of them grass fires, from Tuesday, April 15, through Monday of this week while the Northeast Township Fire Chief answered three alarms, all grass fires, during the same period.

Farmington Fire Chief Leo Hendricks and Northeast Township Fire Chief Roy Bell warn residents who burn grass or brush without a permit that they can be held responsible for the damage caused by their fires.

Heaviest day for the Farmington firemen was Wednesday, April 17, when they answered eight alarms, seven of them grass fires. The other alarm was a car fire on the Cut-Off behind 30711 Grand River Avenue, firemen reported. Another car fire broke out in an automobile parked behind the Grand Cab Company Saturday night. Firemen reported the upholstery was damaged.


