FARMINGTON AAUW MEMBERS ATTEND REGIONAL MEETING

Seven hundred and sixty-eight women, over four hundred of them from Michigan, gathered in Grand Rapids April 25-26 to attend the largest regional convention of the American Association of University Women ever held in this area.

Delegates from Farmington included Mrs. Clarence Stoll, local branch president, Mrs. Paul Calkins, Mrs. R. M. Grininger, Mrs. George Nabstoll, Jr., and Mrs. Lloyd Smith, Jr.

"Our Responsibilities in the World of Today" was the conference theme. The five states represented at the regional conference were Michigan, Ohio, Indiana, Illinois and Wisconsin.

Miss Christine Hainig, a member of the national staff of the AAUW and a specialist in childhood education, described the work done last summer under State Department auspices of establishing kindergartens in the American sector of Berlin. Miss Hainig, who was in charge of this program, spoke at the Friday luncheon meeting of the conference.

Dr. Ina Corlone Brown, professor of social anthropology at Scarritt College, Nashville, Tennessee, and chairman of the AAUW national Social Studies Committee was the headline speaker at the conference dinner Friday.

Dr. Brown is a specialist in the area of race relations, and is the author of two books on the general subject of American race relations and democracy.

Dr. Harlan Hatcher, president of the University of Michigan, discussed some of the problems of higher education at the closing luncheon on Saturday.

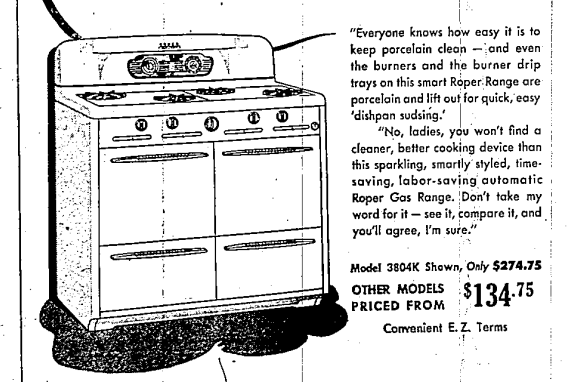

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The Leyte, which has been in the Orient and Mediterranean waters in the past 18 months, is qualifying squadrons in carrier operations in the Atlantic ocean.

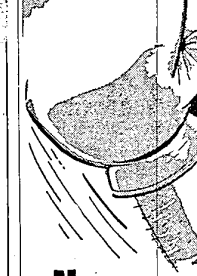
Last year, 3,240 boys and girls under 15 years of age were killed in traffic accidents.

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
