Jersey Housewife Finds Short Cuts In Packing Lunches

If you are one of the thousands of wife who pack lunches for husbands, school children or other members of the family, you may be interested in a report from a New Jersey housewife on how she saves time every evening for and the working time on half. Her story, as reported by the state extension service: Although she already was in the habit of washing out lunch box and vacuum bottle every evening for overnight airing, and though she used an electric mixer to make up sandwich spreads speedily to keep in the refrigerator, when she clocked her morning packing job, she found it took 15 minutes for just the one lunch for her husband.

After enrolling in extension meetings on simplifying housework, she found that by arranging the center where utensils, supplies and equipment for the job were assembled with easy reach and sight, she could cut the time to seven minutes. A portable cabinet with a 27-inch top counter and a drawer that was being used for recipes stood between her refrigerator and sink. She partitioned the drawer to keep a small slicing board, spreaders, knives and lunch bags convenient to reach. She built a shelf underneath to hold two mixing hand-pour cardboard cartons for salads or desserts, and canned lunch foods. On the wall above she installed a shelf for seasonings and a roller-holder for waxed paper. She placed a tray on the top of the refrigerator to carry spreads and fillings or crisp foods like lettuce, celery and other crisp vegetables from refrigerator to packing center. With this simple set-up, she could put up the lunch while the breakfast coffee brewed. Eight minutes saved may not seem much until it is multiplied by days and years — or by several lunches to pack.
