TROJANS LOSE
TO NORTHVILLE
IN LEAGUE TILT

The Clarenceville Trojan baseball team dropped their second game of the season to the Northville Mustangs 3 to 2 in eight innings on a two-hit performance by the Northville pitcher, Rowe. He struck out 21 Trojan batters in the eight innings April 28 on the Clarenceville diamond. Starting pitcher for the Trojans, Glen Evans, pitched the entire game for the loss. Evans struck out 6, walked 4, and allowed two earned runs while his team-mates allowed four errors.

Joe Whyte, star third-sacker, spoiled Rowe's no hitter by snuggling in the fifth and eighth, collecting the only hits for the Trojans.

Northville scored their first run in the third inning on a walk, two errors and a fielder's choice.

Clarenceville came back to tie it up in the third inning after Rutla struck out and Evans struck out, then Myers reached second on a two-base error by the first baseman. Robitaille and Whyte walked to fill the bases. Rousseaux worked the count to 3 to 2 and then walked to score the run. Patterson struck out to end the inning.

Northville came back in the next inning on two doubles and a single to bring the score to 2-1.

Clarenceville tied it up when Evan and Myers struck out. Robitaille walked and stole second. Whyte singled to third to collect the first hit off Rowe, scoring Robitaille. Rousseaux struck out to end the inning.

Northville clinched the game in the eighth inning on two hits and a sacrifice.

The Trojans were unable to score in the top half of the eighth inning to lose their first league game.

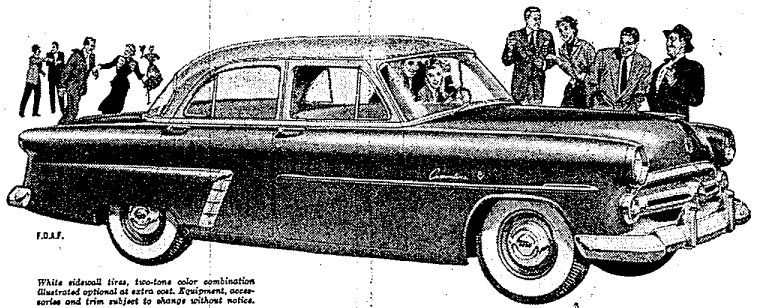
