### TO OFFER CLINICS FOR HIGH SCHOOL STUDENTS AT MSC

A series of 12 counseling clinics for high school graduates will be offered again this summer by Michigan State College.

The three-day clinics, which begin June 16, are designed mainly for students planning to enter Michigan in the fall term. The service also is available to other high school graduates who might wish to know their aptitude and abilities either for college or vocational pursuits, according to Dr. Paul L. Dressel, director of the MSC Counseling Center.

Students will be given a battery of tests to determine academic aptitude, personality, skills and interests and special aptitude tests to suit the needs of individual students. Students planning to enter MSC in the fall also will take part in several orientation activities, designed to make their adjustment to college life easier.

The clinics will be held June 16-18; June 30-July 2; July 8-10; July 15-17; July 22-24; July 29-31; August 12-14; August 19-21; August 26-28 and September 9-11. Further information may be secured by writing the MSC Counseling Center, East Lansing.

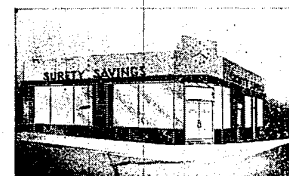
