ENROLL STUDENTS AT CLARENCEVILLE FOR COMING YEAR

Plans are now going ahead in the Clarenceville School District for the enrollment of students for next year, officials stated this week.

Pre-registration of high school students opened May 20 and will continue through May 23. Max Miller, high school principal, announced. Those who can not be taken care of during this period will register on May 29. Class sponsors are handling the registrations.

Parents and students are given an opportunity under the program to select their courses. Parents must approve the student's program before it can be adopted. Miller stated that parents are urged to contact the school regarding the selection of classes.

A number of new courses are being offered for the coming year. French I will be offered for the first time in September, as well as Industrial Arts courses in drafting and woodworking.

Enrollment of prospective kindergarten students will be held on May 28 at both the Edgewood and Central Schools, Stanley Irish, elementary coordinator, announced Tuesday. Children whose family name begins with the letter "A" through "L" will register in the morning of May 28 and those whose family name begins with the letter "M" through "Z" will register in the afternoon.

Any child who will be five years old on or before December 1, 1952, is eligible to enroll. Parents must bring a birth certificate with them when they register their child. Homebound mothers will serve tea at both schools in the morning and afternoon. Regular kindergarten classes will not be held on May 28.

of the lot in between. This way they can secure straight frontage on Osamus as the site for the new northwest section elementary school.

The Board explained that there will be no loss in the trade, it is simply an exchange of property to provide a more adequate site for the new elementary school.

The other proposal to be voted on has to do with the transfer of excess funds from the 1948 debt fund to the 1952 Building, Site and Equipment Fund. Due to the increase in building in the District and the percentage of payment on taxes, a sufficient amount of money has been collected to meet the 1948 gymnasium-classroom debt, which was to have covered a five-year period.

New Addition To House Northwest Fire Truck

The fire equipment for the Northwest Township Fire Station will be moved to a new addition on Bell's Garage at 32581 Northwestern Highway when the addition is completed. Roy Bell, fire chief for the station, announced this week.

The equipment is at present housed within the garage. The fire chief stated that crowded conditions in the garage necessitated the expansion. Bell explained he sold his business in Highland Park where he was located for 27 years and his expanding business at Northwestern required the addition.

Construction of the addition is being paid for by Bell and is being built of cement block. It will be 20 feet by 40 feet when completed. There will be two entrances, a door at the south side of the addition and an opening on the north side for the fire truck to Northwestern Highway. Bell receives rental from the Township for storing the fire equipment.
