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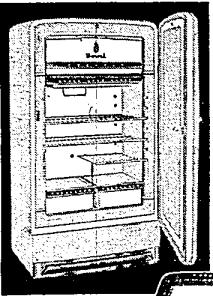
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NOTICE OF ANNUAL ELECTION AND MEETING

Mr. and Mrs. Len Boughton of Jefferson Street attended the funeral of her aunt on Friday.

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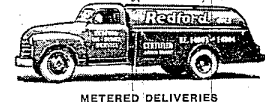
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
