### Dress Windows With Plants

Why not arrange to bring the outdoors into your home? Give heavy draperies and hangings a vacation for a season and dress up your windows with plants.

Elmer P. Roth, chief of the Michigan State College department of textiles, clothing and related arts, is not suggesting a bare window graced by a lone plant on the window sill. He is recommending a vigorous treatment of both plants and windows in order to spruce up home decoration for the summer season.

An idea especially good for picture or bay windows is to frame the whole window with a climbing plant. It will take a surprisingly short time to get ivy or philodendron up the wall. Use inconspicuous string or wire trellises to lead the plant in the proper direction, Miss Roth advised.

For a daisy-like effect, try using wall bracket pots on the sides of the window. The plants should be vine-type so they will grow gracefully downward. Miss Roth thinks that brackets placed quite close together will give the most striking effect because the vines will make a continuous line at the side of the window.

Careful use of plants on window shelves will brighten your rooms for countless summer living. The specialist suggests putting the plants in probably made of glass — at structural points, that is, along natural divisions in the window.

Interesting containers can be used for an inside flower garden on the window sill. Try using a long bread basket, for instance, or a miniature window box made for the purpose.

Home Economists Give Parsley Use Hints

Do you shy away from buying parsley because you haven't much use for it except as a garnish? Michigan State College home economists contend that parsley, even though it generally comes in big bunches, can be a good buy.

Of course, parsley is best known as a garnish, but the left-overs are useful, too. Mrs. Hazel Amos of the MSC foods and nutrition department suggests chopping the left-over parsley into small pieces and drying in the oven. The dried parsley is just as effective as fresh. Soak it for a few minutes before you use it, Mrs. Amos says, and you have nearly fresh parsley except for the bright color.

Another use for left-over parsley is as a deodorizer in your refrigerator. The bright green color means it is strong in chlorophyll. It is an effective deodorizing agent. Leave the parsley in the refrigerator and it will act in the same way as commercial deodorants, Mrs. Amos says.

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### NYLON CLOTHES CAN TAKE GOOD WASHING

Your nylon clothes are no shrinking wretches, so don't be afraid to treat them with a firm hand, says Carolyn B. Middleton of Michigan State College textiles and clothing department.

To begin with, nylon is such a strong fiber that unless nylon thread is used in making repairs the material will cut through on the thread. So have no fears about tossing nylon garments into the washing machine or automatic washer — it is the best way to keep white nylon clean. Miss Middleton cautions, however, not to combine white nylon and colored items in the same washer load — nylon tends to pick up dyes from other fabrics.

Another tip offered by the MSC specialist is that yellowed nylon garments can be bleached successfully in a weak solution of any household bleach.

Sewing with nylon may require some adjustment. Sharp fine needles penetrate nylon easier and make upstitching easier. The fewer stitches per inch the better — as few as seven stitches per inch may be used, particularly for inside seams. Lower the tension on your machine until a well-formed but loose stitch is made, Miss Middleton advised.

Nylon thread is best for sewing on nylon — or the next closest thread on the market to white now is satisfactory. Using tissue or ordinary shelf paper under sheer fabrics while sewing often gives smoother seams.

Another way to sew with nylon is to experiment with your machine. Miss Middleton urged. Finishing and pressing nylon garments should be the same as with ordinary cotton; that is, be sure to press each seam after sewing and finish all the raw edges.
