

Dumping Minnows In Lake Affects Future Fishing

Dumping unused minnows in the lake is a good way of encouraging poor fishing in the future, the conservation department cautions anglers.

Not only is it illegal to release minnows and other live bait fish in any lake or stream, the department says that no kinds of live fish may be used in fishing on some designated trout lakes either.

Frequently, a second poisoning of a lake substantiates the suspicions of fishery workers — that the undesirable types of minnows had been re-introduced.

TRAFFIC DEATHS DECREASE DURING MONTH OF APRIL

Michigan traffic accidents claimed 98 lives during April, the latest month for which figures are complete. This total is 19 fewer than the same month last year. Injuries and accidents also decreased according to the State Police monthly statistical report.

There were 3,521 persons injured, a decrease of 383, or ten per cent, under the 3,904 last year. Accidents totaled 11,417, a decrease of 1,475, or 11 per cent, under 13,122.

It was the second month in 1952 that deaths, injuries and accidents were less than during the same month in 1951. A decrease also was shown in January. April deaths dropped very sharply in urban areas but injuries and accidents showed the greatest reduction in rural areas. Rural county road fatalities increased.

Michigan's traffic toll for the first four months of 1952 included 422 persons killed and 13,489 injured in 52,245 accidents. Deaths were down 32, or seven per cent, under 454 last year. Injuries were up 78, or one per cent, over 13,411 and accidents dropped 3,297, or six per cent, under 55,485.

Motor vehicle travel on Michigan highways during March, the latest month for which complete figures are available, was 1.69 billion miles. This was a decrease of nine per cent under the 1.85 billion miles traveled in March last year. Mileage for the first three months of this year was one per cent above last year, 5.16 billion over 5.12 billion. The death rate of 6.32 per 100 million miles of travel was four per cent below the 6.59 for the same period in 1951.

Average Angler Takes More Perch, Bluegills

"Mr. Average Angler" will catch three perch and bluegills for each one of any other type caught in Michigan non-trout waters this year.

For the last ten years, these two panfish have accounted for well over 50 per cent of the numbers of all game fish taken in Michigan non-trout waters, and last year was no exception. According to the conservation department 1951 creel census report, bluegills and perch accounted for about 75 per cent of the state's inland non-trout water catch.
