

# Give Hints For Owners To Avoid Sheep Bloat

Bloat is an ever-present problem of sheep owners during the pasture season. But Graydon Blank, Michigan State College animal husbandry specialist, has some suggestions to help cut losses from bloat.

Blank says that you should provide shade in the pasture. Otherwise sheep will spend most of the day away from the pasture and will be too hungry by the time they walk to the pasture in the evening. Water also should be available in the pasture.

A phenothiazine and salt mix should be kept available for the animals in the field. Another suggestion which seems to help is to turn sheep on lush pasture only after giving them a full feed of dry hay. Then keep a supply of dry hay before the flock walks on pasture. Some farmers do this by spreading several loads of chopped hay over the pasture with a manure spreader.

# GIVES METHOD FOR CONTROLLING ROSE CHAFER

The time of year has arrived when gardeners can expect to be bothered by the rose chaffer, reports Willard E. Rosserman, Assistant County Agricultural Agent.

The rose chaffer is a common and abundant beetle in sandy areas. It is slender, about one-half inch long, yellow and has long, spiny legs. The beetles appear as the grapes are coming into bloom and feed on the flowers of grapes, roses and many other plants.

The female burrows from three to six inches in sandy soil and lays eggs in small batches. The eggs hatch in about three weeks and the grubs feed on grass roots and weeds. They "over-winter" as grubs and emerge as beetles in June.

Control is difficult because as you kill your beetles, more fly in from someplace else, but there are certain things that can be done.

Where it is safe, cover grapes and raspberries with DDT just before the buds open. Of course, no insecticide should be applied after buds open because of the danger to bees. Use two tablespoons of 50% wettable DDT per gallon of water.

After berries have formed on raspberries, rotenone can be used. It is necessary to keep an insecticide on the plants.

Chlordane applied at the rate of 1/5 to 1/4 lb. per 1,000 square feet in lawns and sodded areas before the beetles emerge will help control them. Chlordane is very poisonous so follow every precaution when using it.

# PRESERVE FLAVOR OF VEGETABLES WITH PROPER CARE

Those few fleeting hours after fresh garden produce is picked are worth prolonging. If you select carefully and then care for the vegetables and fruits correctly you will be rewarded with flavorful, nutritious produce.

Louise Kelley of the Michigan State College food and nutrition departments declared:

Be sure to examine fresh produce carefully before you buy, she urged. Fresh, crisp, whole products are what you want to look for. And when you find them she warned against overstocking. Long storage cuts down on flavor and food value of such seasonal foods as asparagus, peas, greens, chard and strawberries. So buy only amounts you can use immediately.

When you do have to store fresh garden vegetables and fruits, be sure to keep them as much like they came from the garden as you can. Peas can be shelled shortly before they are to be cooked, but don't allow unshelled or shelled peas to stand at room temperature. Always refrigerate peas until just before cooking time, Miss Kelley warned.

Asparagus and greens can be trimmed a little early, but keep covered in the refrigerator. Rhubarb, too, should be refrigerated. She said, "If you don't have the flavor if they are too cold, so plan to keep them at room temperature before serving, Miss Kelley suggested.

MSU specialists offered tips on cooking these on-the-market products. She recommends cooking fresh peas as rapidly as possible and until they are just tender, but not mushy and overcooked. Asparagus should be washed in cold water after tough stalk ends have been cut off. Aside from asparagus, Miss Kelley suggested saving some of the tender tips for salads combined with hard-cooked eggs or cucumbers.

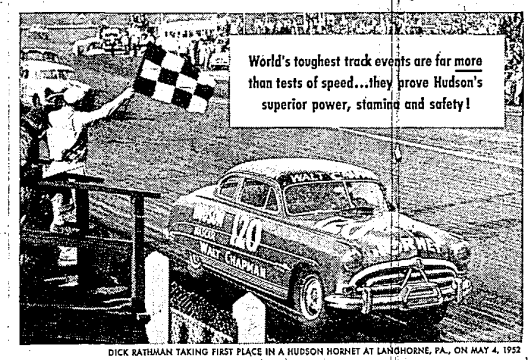
