 service in the future, but the delay in getting it has denied the owners of the business a return on their investment that cannot be recovered. Patterson pointed out that less than half the ordered rate increase will remain with the company. More than half of it, he said, will go to the Federal government in taxes.
 Referring to a recent \$7,000,000 wage boost to employees, and an increase in state and Federal taxes 3 1/2 times what they were in 1940, Patterson stated: "The price of most everything else has gone up much faster and much more than the price of telephone service, including the increase granted last week. Michigan Bell revenues will have risen only 27 1/2 while overall costs of living have gone up 89 %."

Farmington City Park To Be Policed, Posted

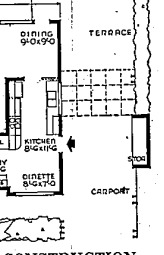
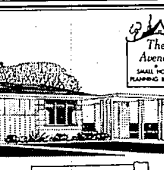
The City Manager has been authorized to post the City Park on Shawwassee Street and to have it policed in an effort to cut down the destruction of property.

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Pasture Cuts Cost Of Feeding Pigs

There are several good reasons for using pasture in the swine feeding program, according to Michigan State College animal husbandmen.
 For one thing, pork can be produced at a 10 to 15 per cent saving in the amount of grain fed. Pasture also will save up to 50 per cent of the protein-rich feed requirements. Usually, fatter pigs are made on pasture, the M.S.C. specialists say.
 Pasturing hogs saves labor and helps maintain soil fertility. There usually are fewer runs in pastured litters.

Yuh know this bacon really makes a bacon and tomato sandwich taste lots gooder — and we've got a fresh batch comin' outta the smoke house this week end — we don't mean sandwiches — we mean jest the bacon — OK?

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
