New Mirror and Saw Transform Old Bedroom

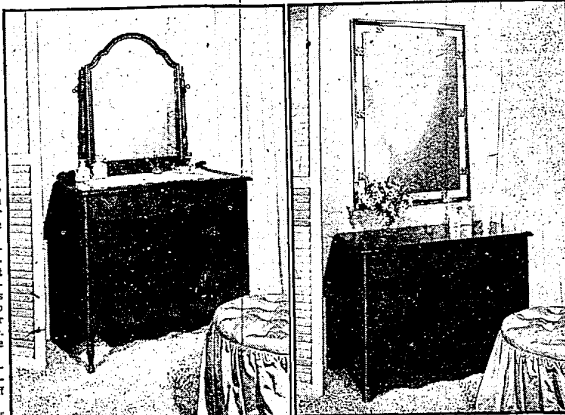

HAVE you taken a good impartial look at your bedroom suite lately? The chances are very good that it's become a bit shabby with the passing years. But the chances are also good that the budget won't take a big bite for a new suite.

Even if you can't afford to toss out the old furniture, you can make it look like you've got just as you'd buy a new hat to dress up an old suit, so you can turn a shabby, out-of-date dresser into a handsome, modern piece through the use of mirror magic.

If your dresser is the old-fashioned type with mirror attached, the first step is to strip it of gingerbread. Using a screwdriver, remove the mirror and its moldings. Use putty to plug up the holes and a coat of shellac or varnish to smooth the surface. Then you're ready to remove the legs.

To get a close-to-the-floor effect, in keeping with modern design trends, use a saw to take off the high, spindle legs.

Now you can apply decorator's magic. Pick a new mirror, one in good design, chosen to blend in with the style of your new furniture. Hang it flat on the wall over the dresser, placing it vertically at eye level and centering it so that

not more than three inches of side. That's all there is to the worked wonders for your bedroom dresser extends beyond it on either a face-lining. But you'll find you've on more pin-money.

SHOULDER PRESSURE CANNER FOR NEW SEASON

Make a firm resolve today to get your pressure canner in order for the coming season. Mrs. Josephine H. Lawyer, county home demonstration agent, urged.

Check for cleanliness at openings to the petcock, safety valve and pressure gauge. If the openings are clogged and not so during canning, the dial or slide pressure gauges may not register correct pressures. Mrs. Lawyer warned. All air might not be driven out of the canner. Never tilt or the safety valve may fall to work when pressure becomes too high if the openings are clogged.

To clean the petcock and safety valve openings effectively, Mrs. Lawyer recommends drawing a string or narrow strip of cloth through them frequently. Never use sharp tools, she warned, for they may nick or damage the openings. Occasionally remove the petcock and safety valve and soak them in vinegar for a short time.

Unscrew the ball-and-socket type of safety valve and clean after each use. Occasionally clean with silver polish the ball and socket into which the ball fits, Mrs. Lawyer advised.

Dried food and dirt on the edges of the kettle will prevent a tight seal and also mean to leak out. To check for this, keep the kettle edges meticulously clean. Another thing to watch for is a scale formed by hard water that might prevent a tight seal. A new rubber gasket. If not, be sure it is clean and free from grease. You may find the gasket can be used upside down when you no longer have a perfect seal in the original position.

Suggests Air Drying Dishes To Save Time

If you haven't already changed to air drying your dishes, now is the time — there are too many outdoor things to do to spend unnecessary time in the kitchen. Mrs. Josephine Lawyer, county home demonstration agent, gives some pointers on the relatively new air-drying method.

After washing the dishes, rinse for a few moments in a pan of hot water, about 140 degrees. This rinse will be more effective in eliminating bacteria than a quick rinse of hotter water. Following the rinse, put the dishes on a rubber-coated rack. These attractive racks come in many colors and the rubber coating cuts down noise and breakage. Only the silver will need towel treatment, Mrs. Lawyer says.

Agent Gives Methods For Picnic Fun

Don't take all the fun out of a picnic by wearing yourself out with previous preparations. Cook when you get there, Mrs. Josephine Lawyer, county home demonstration agent, advises.

Charcoal cookery has one big secret. Wait for the charcoal to become a glowing ball of fire covered with gray ashes before you begin cooking. Faye Kinard, Michigan State College specialist in foods and nutrition, suggests barbecuing some of the plentiful chicken in markets now. Use a half a broiler per person. Hamburgers fried over an open fire have a special flavor enhanced even more by charcoal toasted buns.

For an easy, hearty picnic dessert, make fruit dumplings in coffee cans that can be disposed of later. Put sweetened fruit in the can and drop in spoonfuls of dough — cook until dough is done over your charcoal fire.
