The board will review present daily allowable production from the Beaver Creek pool in Kalkaska County and from the Paris Traverse pool in Mecosta County.

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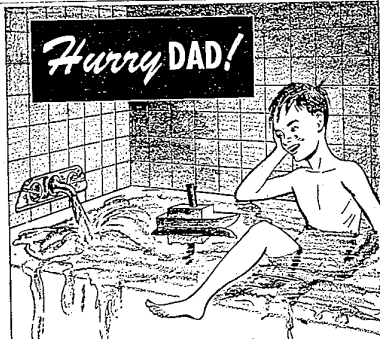
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Janet Robertson Weds W. Chapman

FARMINGTON LIONS CLUB SEEKS FUNDS FOR LEADER DOGS

Members of the Farmington Lions Club are seeking funds to help Kris Winters, the blind person, whose leader dog was killed in Detroit recently, and other blind people who need leader dogs to help them navigate streets and crossings in their everyday life.

H. E. Viergutz, DVM, a member of the Farmington Lions Club, related the accident in Detroit in which "Lucky", the seeing eye dog of Kris Winters, crazed with pain after being run over by the wheel of a truck, broke his master's hand with a biting snap. Viergutz reported the accident has thrown the spotlight on a crucial need for funds by the Leader Dog League of the Blind, Inc., of Rochester, where Lucky was trained and where Kris Winters will return to get another dog.

At present there are five blind people at the school training with dogs at one time. There is a waiting list of 160 names. It costs \$1,250 for each dog to be properly trained. Lions Clubs and other organizations in the area are trying to raise funds for work and \$100,000 for a new dormitory that will greatly increase the number of dogs to be trained at one time.

Persons may make donations through members of the Farmington Lions Club or make checks payable to the Leader Dog League for the Blind, Inc., and send them to Rochester, Michigan.

No Affidavit Required To Collect Pelt Unions

Notarized affidavit as to time, place and manner of taking coyotes, wolves and beavers is no longer required, the conservation department advises.

Recent conservation commission action eliminates the expense of providing notary public commissions for conservation officers and the need for pelt sealing, resulting in a slight saving.

State statute still specifies that: "Any person who shall secure or attempt to secure any bounty payment under the provisions of this act by fraud or false statements of any kind, shall be guilty of a felony..." etc."

To Set Duck, Goose Hunting Season Later

Although duck and goose hunters must remain in the dark on waterfowl provisions until breeding ground investigations are completed, some indications of season length and bag limits have been provided by the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service.

The Service each year collects information for the use of states on the waterfowl flyways in setting seasons and limits.

For Michigan, the opening date is expected, not later than October 1, and the closing date will not be later than January 10. Last year, Michigan hunters could shoot ducks, geese and geese from October 12 to November 25.

Michigan may choose October 1 or any day thereafter to open the waterfowl season, and may close it any day on or before January 10. The noon opening on the first day will again be recognized, as in past years.

Over 1,000 Michigan residents picked up their Michigan fishing licenses in Ohio, Indiana and Wisconsin last year.
