During the course he received instructions in such subjects as theory of operation, block form printing, sending and receiving messages by semaphore flags, field message procedure, radio procedure, preventive maintenance of radio equipment and field training.

The course prepares communication personnel for radio work with equipment used in Marine organizations.

He was inducted in the Marine Corps on December 20, 1951, at Detroit, and received his recruit training at the Marine Corps Recruit Depot at San Diego.

He is now awaiting assignment as a field radio operator with a regular unit.

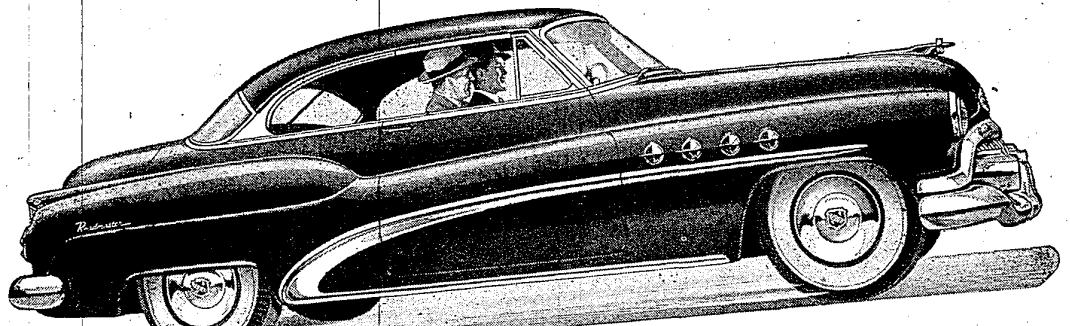
