DOG WARDEN FINED ON CRUELTY TO ANIMALS CHARGE

E. F. Ballou, 21184 Cass Avenue, deputy dog warden for the Farmington area, was found guilty in Justice Court Monday evening on a charge of cruelty to animals and was fined \$25 plus \$75 costs or 90 days in jail by Justice Allen C. Ingie.

Ballou started action to appeal the case to Circuit Court immediately after paying the fine and court cost. He was found guilty by a jury of two men and four women who heard testimony from a large number of witnesses. The formal complaint against Ballou was filed by Albert Sundell, a humane officer for the Oakland County Animal Welfare Society.

Ballou was charged with chaining his dog in the hot sun all day without water. The dog warden countered that the leash was long enough to permit the dog to reach the dog house where water was available. He added that the charge was made against him out of spite because of his insistence that residents of the Farmington area keep their dogs tied.

Obituary

Leo F. Coffman

Funeral services were held Friday, June 27, for Leo F. Coffman, 29649 Thirteen Mile Road, who passed away suddenly Tuesday.

He was an amateur horticulturist. Leo F. Coffman was born September 11, 1892, in Illinois, the son of a physician. He spent his boyhood in Kansas. He was 14 when he joined a "road show" as its piano player.

After a while he got into the machinery business and came to Detroit. Things were up and down. He made two or three fortunes and lost them; started over.

Later he sold his business and bought a few acres on Thirteen Mile Road where he could enjoy his hobby . . . raising berries, roses, tuberosas, begonias and aspens. With his charming wife, Blanche, a Kansas girl, he built a house, sold it, built another. Meanwhile he joined the Men's Garden Club of America and became a valuable member. He became vice-president in the Detroit Regional Club. Became active in the North Farmington Civic Association; was made chairman.

A month ago, while taking his mother, who had died at an advanced age, to Kansas City for burial, he suffered a heart attack. A heart specialist advised him to take things easy.

Shortly afterwards he confided to a neighbor:

"This is tough. When I get to the place where I can't tend my flowers I'm not so sure I want to be around." The next day he died.

The funeral was held Friday, June 27, at St. Kelly's Funeral Home. Burial was in Acacia Park Cemetery. The minister was Rev. Frank Glabach.

Mrs. Coffman and a brother, Waldo H. of Houston, Texas, survive.
