

Urge Residents To Put Information On Mail Box

If you are not getting prompt delivery of your mail it may be that your name, address and street is not printed on your mail box, a spokesman for the Farmington Post Office stated this week.

All residents on routes are urged to print or write their name and address on their mail box if they have not already done so. With new carriers added to the staff it is very important that this be done as they may not be familiar with all of the residents on their route.

Distribution cases for the new carriers are expected to be delivered within the next few weeks which will greatly speed up the handling of mail. At the present time this mail has to be sorted on tables which slows down the delivery process.
