Recent extensive mortality of fish in Fremont Lake, Newaygo County, was limited to black crappies and was due mainly to infection, conservation department investigation indicates.

Damage by bacteria, cytophaga columnaris, to the gills appeared to have been serious enough to have caused fish deaths.
