**Archers Get Second Chance At Carp, Garpike**

As of July 15 it will be legal to shoot carp, dogfish, and garpike with bow and arrow (or spear) on some 200 designated southern inland lakes and rivers. The season will remain open until August 15.

The sport was made popular by archers who rig bow and arrow in to a harpoon arrangement and shoot the noxious fish from boats or shores.

This is the first year the conservation department has legalized the sport. First portion of the season ended May 15.

**STATE'S BIGGEST BROWN TROUT WEIGHS 17 1/3 LBS**

Believed to be the biggest brown trout ever taken in Michigan is a 17-pound five-ounce fish caught in Houghton Creek, Ogemaw County, the conservation department reports.

Hooked by Harold Crawford of Cass City, the trout breaks the brown trout record which had held for 12 years. Largest previous brown of department record is a 15-pound six-ounce giant taken in Dowagiac Creek, Berrien County, June 1949, by Burrell C. High of Niles.

Conservation department officer Robert Van Camp says Crawford's trout was 35 5/8 inches long and 19 inches in girth. Old lamprey scars were noted on the left side behind the dorsal fin.

Crawford, fishing near 11 p.m., used worms with a number 16 hook on a telescopic casting rod. World's record, by rod and reel, is a 39 1/2-pound brown taken at Loch Awe, Scotland, in 1866.
