O. Bates, president of the Farmington Area Recreation Commission, appeared before the Board regarding the financial responsibility for the school buses. He also made a formal request for the annual contribution from the Board to the Recreation Commission. Bates added that he would like to convey a report from the District showing the services contributed by the schools over and above the actual cash contribution. The questions presented by Bates will be taken up at the next meeting of the Board.

Authorization was given to the treasurer to invest surplus funds of the District in improved government securities. School officials were given the authority to purchase 705 desk-chair units for the elementary grades contingent upon an opinion from the school attorney as to whether the advertising of bids is required. A large number of bids were secured at the request of school officials.

NEW MEN'S GROUP OPTIMIST CHARTER

The newly formed Clarenceville Men's Group has petitioned the Optimist Club for a charter. It was announced following a meeting of the group Tuesday evening at Huck's Redford Inn.

Twenty-two men from the Clarenceville area were present at the meeting as well as 14 members of the Southfield Optimist Club. Between 20 and 25 men have indicated their desire to be charter members of the club.

The next meeting of the group will be held next Wednesday evening at Huck's Redford Inn. Regular meetings will be held on the first and third Wednesdays of each month.

Police Capture Three Youths In Truck Theft

Three boys, one thirteen years old and two fourteen years old from Detroit were apprehended in Farmington at 2:55 a.m. Monday with a stolen pick-up truck. Farmington police reported this week.

Police stated the boys were spotted at the intersection of Farmington Road and Grand River Avenue. After the boys abandoned the truck they ran behind the Municipal Building on Grand River Avenue and around other buildings. It took the officers a half hour to round up all three of the boys.

Police turned them over to juvenile authorities in Detroit.

STATE POLICE CAPTAIN RETURNS FROM JAPAN DUTY

Captain Harold F. Mulbar of the Michigan State Police, has returned to East Lansing after spending a two-year leave of absence in Japan as police and public safety administrator for the allied occupation forces.

It was Mulbar's third visit to that country. In 1946 he and former State Police Commissioner Oscar G. Olander went to Japan for 90 days to make a survey of the police system for the occupation forces. At the U. S. government's request, he returned there in 1948 as a police administrator, remaining about two years. In 1950 the government asked him to go back, this time as chief police administrator for the national civil police of 125,000 members.

Mulbar's mission was completed with the signing of the Japanese peace treaty and the return of civil authority to that government. Prior to his departure the Japanese government awarded Mulbar their highest civilian decoration in appreciation of his services. He also received a citation from Brig. General Entus, assistant chief of staff at general headquarters.

OFFICER URGES REDUCING SPEED TO CUT ACCIDENTS

Sgt. Henry Kozowicz, commander of the Detroit post of the Michigan State Police, is appealing to motorists to practice strict, self-enforced speed control to reduce the alarming high number of highway accidents.

"Excessive speed is public enemy number one on the highways," Sgt. Kozowicz said. "It is a factor in two out of every five fatal traffic accidents."

"During the summer months when travel is at a peak, speeding is especially hazardous and deadly. Week ends are the worst. Last year 479 persons were killed in Michigan traffic during June, July and August. An average of 21 fatalities occurred every week end.

"Motor vehicle travel this summer is expected to exceed an average of 80 million miles per day. Unless greater caution is taken, particularly in maintaining safe driving speeds, the accident toll will again be shamefully high.

"There is no good reason why accidents cannot be kept at a minimum. It simply requires some effort on the part of drivers. By practicing caution, common sense, lives can be saved and injuries and accidents prevented."

"If you take a motor trip, get off to an early start. Take your time and stay with the normal flow of traffic. Adjust your driving speed to conditions. Be careful and be here next year."
