Veterans Eligible For Discharge Pay

Under the Veterans Readjustment Assistance Act of 1952, men discharged from service since June 26, 1950, are eligible to collect from \$100 to \$300 muster-out pay. The new law provides payments of \$100 to men with less than 60 days of active service; \$200 for more than 60 days but no foreign service and \$300 for 60 days or more including service outside the states.

Men released after June 26, 1950, without getting muster-out pay, will get the amount due in lump sum. Men getting out from now on will get it in \$100 installments. Men not entitled to muster-out pay are those without honorable discharges; those without overseas duty who ask for discharge to accept employment; those whose service consisted solely as students; and those whose active service was for the purpose of training duty or physical examinations.

Wives, husbands, children or parents can claim the money for veterans who have died since discharge.

Applications must be accompanied by the original discharge papers. Application forms are now available at the Veterans Service Office, 111 South Troy Street, Royal Oak, telephone Lincoln 2-3250. Office hours are from 9:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. on Mondays, Tuesdays, Thursdays and Fridays and on Wednesdays from 9:00 a.m. to 9:00 p.m. and Saturdays from 9:00 a.m. to 12:00 noon.

Storm Lashes Campers At Grand Haven Park

Campers at Grand Haven state they got rough treatment from Lake Michigan storm that struck at night with hurricane force.

The Coast Guard station reported winds above 55 miles per hour during the storm that blew tents apart, knocked trailers off roadways, and uprooted trees.

One trailer was overturned during the storm and fire aid had to be administered to an occupant. Fish were found in the center of the park drive, blown there by the storm's force.

Tells Difference In Kinds Of Berries

Some folks confuse blueberries with huckleberries and would like to know the difference, reports Willard E. Bosserman, Assistant County Agricultural Agent.

Blueberries have small, soft seeds which are quite insignificant while huckleberries have hard seeds that are noticeable.

Blueberry varieties range from the small wild berries found in marshes and swamps to the large berry grown on cultivated muck lands.

Anyone who might be considering growing their own blueberry should know that they require very exacting soil conditions. The soil should be very acid (PH 4.0-5.1) with water table 14-22 inches from the surface. Lots of organic matter is also required by the plants.

Bosserman also states that he has had several requests in recent weeks for information on the killing of weeds on the lawn. 2-4-D will do a good job of eradication. However, in newly established lawns that have been seeded this summer, it is not a good idea to use 2-4-D weed killer, as the chemical will kill young grass seedlings.

Also it is wise to be sure to label containers which have 2-4-D.

Another caution — don't use the same sprayer for spraying vegetables that you use for 2-4-D or other weed controlling chemicals.

Conservation Department Studies Ways To Cut Costs

Increased costs of doing business is catching up with the conservation department too.

In a move to alicie \$750,000 from the 1952-53 fiscal year budget, to prevent a deficit, the department is studying several plans. One proposal is to cut game land purchases, from the game land acquisition fund, down from \$500,000 to \$100,000. Study is under way to determine how divisions supported by game protection funds can make a five per cent alicie in budget across the board with least hindrance to public service.

In recently requesting the study, the conservation commission also asked the director to investigate the feasibility of increasing fishing license fees, particularly the price of the trout stamp.

IT'S THE TRUTH!

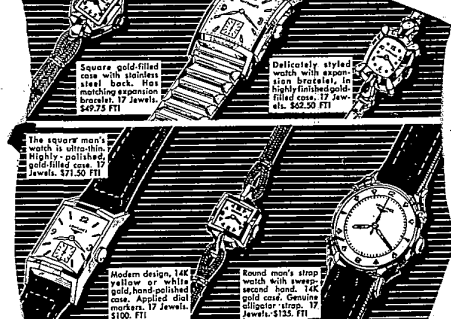
