My mother visiting me for several weeks, plus my youngest acquiring a fractured clavicle, has resulted in my neglecting this column for three issues of The Enterprise. Meanwhile, much has transpired, about which I'll try and bring you up to date. I hope you're noticed that our request for footbridges over the culverts at intersections has been fulfilled, and it certainly makes a big difference in crossing the street corners.

Several years ago the residents of Floral Park were sent a notice advising them that consideration was being given to vacating the so-called alleys in this area, and declaring them easements. At that time you were told to send a post card to the Civic Association if you preferred having the alleys. Very few persons decided they wanted alleys. Many persons then and now have expressed a desire to have them declared easements.

A definite majority have preferred easements. So the City Council, at its regular July meeting, authorized the City Attorney to look into the application of the terms of the City Charter to the vacating of alleys. Before definite action is taken a public hearing will be held and any of us who object will have a chance to be heard. The hearing will be announced in advance in this paper. It is the sincere wish of the officers and trustees of your Civic Association that the energetic persons who led the group of Floral Park residents to the Council Chambers in July and complained about the heavy truck traffic on Shawneese will show up at our next regular meeting, which takes place on Tuesday at 22490 Floral. We need and solicit the participation of such active citizens.

The Council has approved a resolution to incorporate into the City Charter the amendment which was printed in The Enterprise on several occasions dealing with the Council's authority to declare special assessment districts through.

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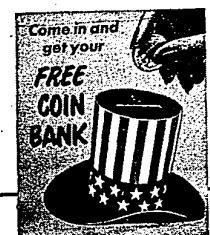
