TRAFFIC DEATHS GAIN IN FIRST HALF OF YEAR

Michigan traffic accounted for 166 deaths during June, bringing the toll for the first six months of the year to 728. This was an increase of 13, or three per cent, over the 710 in the same period last year, and on the basis of previous trends, indicates the 1952 fatality record may exceed the 1951 total of 1,640 by at least 100.

According to the State Police monthly statistical report, it was the highest June death toll since 1941, when 178 were killed. Compared with the same month of the previous year, it was an increase of 29, or 21 per cent, over 137. On the other hand, injuries dropped 402, or nine per cent, 4,957 under 4,160. Accidents decreased 2,090, or 15 per cent, 12,313 under 14,403.

The traffic record for the first six months of the year also included 21,657 injuries and 77,255 accidents. Injuries decreased 498, or two per cent, under 21,159, and accidents decreased 5,268, or ten per cent, under 53,333.

The gain in fatalities was attributed largely to an increase in multiple death accidents.

State Police accident statistics for the past five years show that, on an average, 41 per cent of each annual fatality toll occurs during the first six months. On that basis, it has been estimated that 1952 deaths will total about 1,750. The highest traffic death toll ever reached in Michigan was 2,175 in 1937.

Precautions Will Cut Home Accidents

Mrs. Josephine Lawyer, Oakland County Home Demonstration agent, reminds homemakers that they, through more careful thinking, can help prevent a number of yearly home accidents.

"Women and children take first place as sufferers from burns, statistics on home accidents have shown for years. But housewives could reduce this unfortunate record by taking simple safety measures in their kitchens," home safety advisors of the U. S. Department of Agriculture say.

"To protect young children, who often must be in the kitchen while their mothers work there, fence off a play space away from the stove. Baby's high chair should stand at a safe distance also far enough away so that its young occupant cannot reach hot utensils on the stove top and also far enough away so that the chair can't tip over against the stove. Keep matches in back of the range or on a shelf

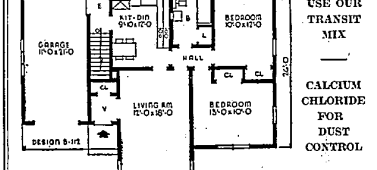
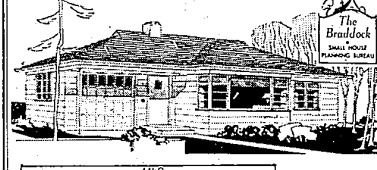
