School District totaled 1,616 during the opening week. Assistant Superintendent Stanley Irish announced Monday. Central Elementary School topped the list with 694 students. Edgewood Grade School had an enrollment of 317 students, bringing the grade school enrollment to 1,011 students. Max Miller, high school principal, stated that a total of 695 students were enrolled in grades seven through twelve during the first week.

Enrollment at the end of the first week last year at Clarenceville was about 1,560 compared to 1,616 this year. It is anticipated that this figure will increase substantially in the next few weeks.

or more, fifty (50) feet in depth; but any building subsequently erected on that side of the street in that block shall not be less and need not be greater than the average depth of the front yards of such existing buildings.

The third suggested change provides for fire-proof construction of exterior walls on industrial buildings.

Ernest Blanchard, Township Supervisor, stated that he is contacting the State Conservation Department to determine if their office has the authority to prohibit hunting in Farmington Township. He added that several townships have recently been designated as "no hunting" areas and is anxious to learn how it was done. The Board indicated that it would favor a hunting ban in the township.

The Board approved the purchase of a foamite extinguisher for the Northeast fire truck. The extinguisher was requested by Roy Bell, fire chief, to be used in fighting oil fires. The Board also approved a motion to hold a fall clean-up throughout the township, probably some time in October.

Reuben Corbin, 20817 Ontario, and Fred Doebler, 20904 St. Francis, appeared before the Board to complain about the condition of the fire hydrants in the Clarenceville section. They referred specifically to the incident two weeks ago when a home exploded on St. Francis Street and firemen were unable to open the hydrant at Byron and St. Francis. Blanchard stated that the water system was in the hands of receivers and outside of township jurisdiction. However, he added that he contacted the receiver and was informed that the hydrants had been closed last November. The residents also complained about open man-holes in the section and requested speed limit signs on St. Francis and Ontario. Blanchard suggested that they contact the Clarenceville School Board regarding signs as this is a school zone.

Several residents appeared before the Board in regard to the Little Valley Trailer Park on Eight mile road. They referred to drainage, sanitary conditions and parking on Eldred Street. They also inquired as to how many trailers could be placed in the park. The Board stated that the original application, which was filed before the zoning ordinance was passed, called for a limit of 71 trailers. The Board stated that they would post no parking signs and improve Eldred Street.
