Some 1,115 Michigan high school driver-education teachers have been trained in institutes similar to the 19th one held recently at the University of Michigan.

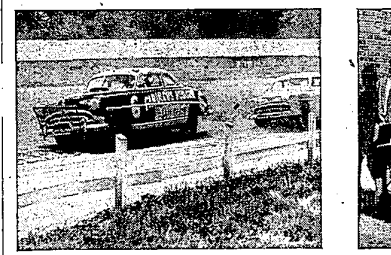

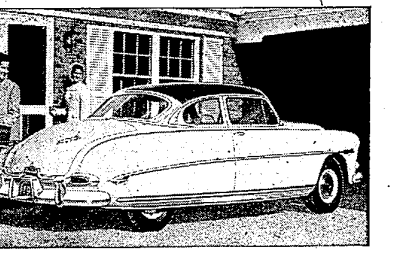
