Most dealers are hardware or sporting goods dealers. Conservation officers will not have licenses to sell, though they will know where licenses are sold in their district.

**Judge Schulte Places Poster In Court Room**

Judge John J. Schulte stated that he has placed a copy of the safety poster "Keep in Line—Don't Cut In" in the court room as a warning to all motorists that the court is cooperating with the safety campaign under the leadership of State Highway Commissioner Charles M. Ziegler, and sponsored by the Michigan State Safety Commission.

He emphasized the seriousness of dangerous passing and said that this results in many different types of accidents such as the following:

Head-on collision with an oncoming vehicle, side-swipe collision with an oncoming vehicle, side-swipe collision with vehicle being passed, "Cut-In" accident with vehicle being passed, vehicle being passed is run off the road into the ditch, passing vehicle goes out of control and hits a tree, "Cut-In" vehicle stops too quickly and is hit in rear, overtaking vehicle hits vehicle coming from cross road and one of the vehicles hits a parked car.

**Reduce Milk Handling To Lower Bacteria Count**

Milk handling equipment will increase bacteria in milk if not kept clean, with surfaces bright and shiny, cautions Donald L. Murny, dairy extension specialist at Michigan State College.

Dairymen should avoid milkstone, a gray chalky film, from building up on equipment because of minerals in water and in milk and unsuitable washing powders, he urges.

**U-M Consumes Large Amount Of Electricity**

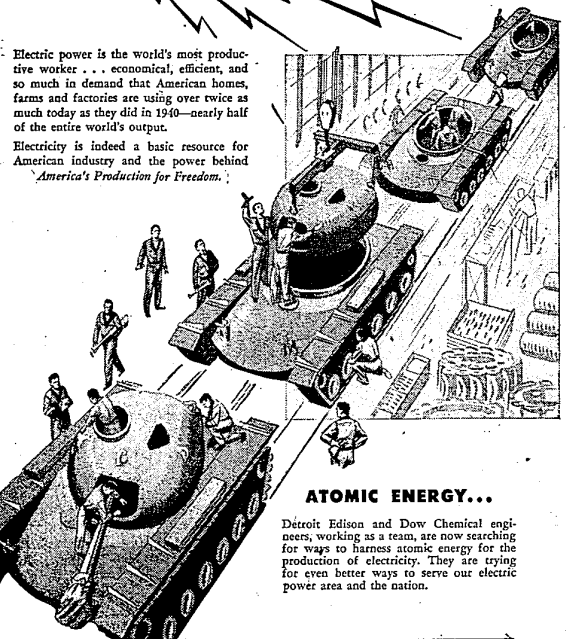

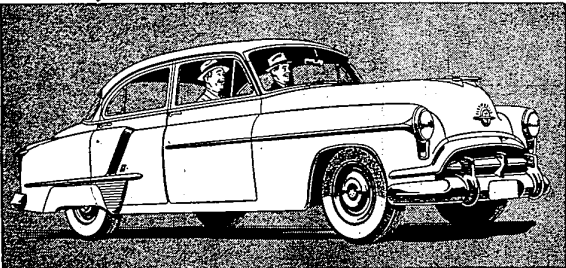
