REMOVE RUST STAIN

HOMEMAKERS GIVE REPORTS DURING MSC CONFERENCE

Hands-across-the-border is a habit with Michigan home demonstration group women. At the Homemakers' Conference held recently at Michigan State College, they continued their custom by voting to send \$200 to Okinawa to assist college girls there to continue their home economics education.

Miss Eleanor Densmore, Kent County home demonstration agent, who has been in Okinawa for the past year, gave a report to the 1-400 women gathered for the 25th annual conference. She encouraged their assistance at the University of the Ryukyus where she will return in late August to continue her work for another year. She is part of a five-person mission to Okinawa from Michigan State College.

As part of their international-mindedness, Mrs. W. S. Hamilton of Jackson state pen pal chairman, announced that 652 members of Michigan home demonstration groups are writing to women in other countries offering encouragement and in many cases, food and clothing.

Last year the Michigan Home Demonstration Council financed the visit of a German girl, Ingeborg, to Michigan for an eight-month visit. Miss Timmler, known now to Michigan as "Inga", wrote to the women from Schleswig-Holstein province where she is teaching in an agricultural school.

She wrote, "After being home ten days I started work at the same school, but what a difference there is in the time! I was in Michigan they built a new school. You American people sent Marshall Plan money and our school is partly built from that money. We now have a very modern kitchen with work-saving machines." Inga reported that she had helped establish a 4-H program in Germany and a specialist training system whereby specialists travel throughout the country teaching home economics to German women.

Warns Against Using Oven For Canning

Never can foods in the oven. That word of warning comes from Mrs. Josephine Lawyer, county home demonstration agent, who explained why oven processing is taboo.

Serious injury can result if cans explode while being heated in the oven, she said, and jars sometimes seal during processing and explode, ruining the stove.

Furthermore, the temperature of food in jars during oven processing does not get high enough to insure destruction of spoilage bacteria in vegetables and meats without exceedingly long processing.

Open-kettle method is not recommended for canning fruits and vegetables, either. In open-kettle canning, food is cooked in an ordinary kettle, then packed into hot jars and sealed without processing. Mrs. Lawyer points out that when the food is transferred from kettle to jar, bacteria may get in and cause the food to spoil.

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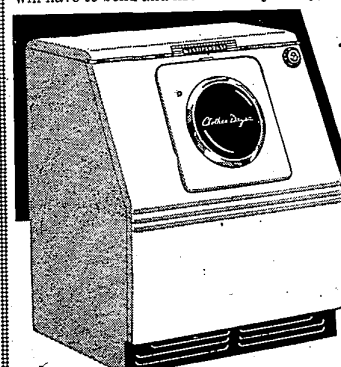
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
