**Carriers' Ruffed
Grouse Count Down**

The annual mid-summer rural mail carriers' count of ruffed grouse shows a slight decrease in the number of birds seen per carrier in the upper peninsula, the conservation department reports.

However, a slight increase was noted in the number of broods counted by each carrier in the northern lower peninsula.

The survey was made by 254 carriers, 88 of whom work in the upper peninsula.

Insignificant increases were noted in brood counts made in the upper peninsula and in the total number of grouse seen in the northern lower peninsula.

May Sight Guns At Pontiac Lake Park

Hunters now can sight in their guns any day of the week at the target range in the Pontiac Lake state recreation area.

The conservation department has had the range open only on week ends in recent weeks. Operated for hunter convenience the last three years, it will close as usual on November 14.

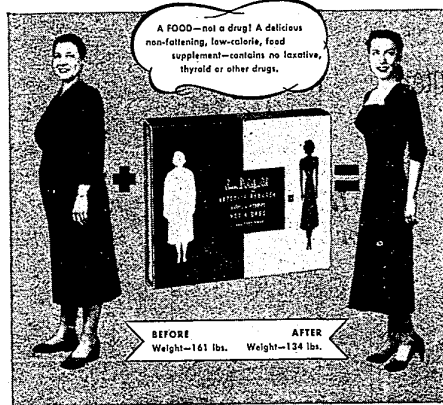

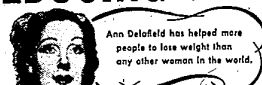
