build a 30-to 50-bed hospital in the city. The property owned by the city at the corner of Nine Mile and Gill Roads was prominently mentioned as a possible site. The legal aspects of the proposal are being investigated by the city.

Proposed plans call for the construction of a one-story, ranch type hospital. It will be privately owned, but local doctors will be invited to join the staff. The hospital will be open on a 24-hour basis and will handle emergency cases.
