Poison Mushrooms Take Detroit's Life

Last Saturday a 37 year old man died in a Detroit hospital as a result of poisoning from eating what he thought were mushrooms. Dr. Joseph G. Molnar, health commissioner, reported this week. The man's wife was critically ill but she recovered.

The poisonous plants were gathered a week ago last Sunday in Kensington Park. They were cooked and eaten by the family the following day and the couple became ill and were hospitalized. Deaths from eating toadstools or other fungus growths are less common than they were some years ago. All mushrooms must be eaten for sale in Detroit must be artificially grown and must bear the grower's name and address. The cases of poisoning which occurred last week are like all similar ones here in that they were due to mistakes in identification of mushrooms gathered by the family or their friends.

JOHN B. MARTIN, JR.

On the basis of his record for rigid control over the expenditure of state funds during his current term in office, Michigan Republicans selected John B. Martin, Jr. of Grand Rapids, to run for re-election as Auditor General.

Martin entered state government as a legislator, winning election in 1946 to the State Senate. During World War II he helped organize and served as head of the National Office of Civilian Defense. Later he was commissioned in the Navy and assigned to the staff of the prosecutor at the Axis war criminal trials in Nuremberg. Upon his discharge as a Lieutenant Commander in 1946, he opened a law practice in Grand Rapids.

Martin was born in Grand Rapids in 1909. He was graduated from Dartmouth College and the University of Michigan Law School. He also attended Oxford University as a Rhodes scholar.

FRANK G. MILLARD

Frank G. Millard, Flint Republican, is candidate for re-election as Attorney General on the November 4 ballot.

Elected to public office for the first time in 1950, Millard, after conducting a careful investigation, brought criminal charges against the leaders of the infamous riot last spring at the State Prison of Southern Michigan. In other major action he struck a blow at organized gambling by obtaining an injunction against the transmission of gambling information by commercial communication services.

A native of Cornua, Millard was graduated from the University of Michigan Law School in 1916, and has practiced law in Flint ever since, with time out for service in both World Wars I and II. In 1921 he helped re-organize the Michigan National Guard.

He was Flint city attorney from 1927 to 1934, and a special assistant attorney general in 1947 and 1948. He is former president of the Genesee County Bar Association, and a member of the State and National Bar Associations.

ROBERT J. BAKER

Robert J. Baker, 30, the Democratic candidate for Auditor General, resides in Adrian where he practices law with the firm of Baker and Baker. He was born in Owosso, and lived in Jackson and Muskegon prior to moving to Adrian.

He received his A. B. degree at Adrian and his law degree from Ohio Northern University. Baker served as City Attorney for Adrian during 1947-1949. He was District Supervisor, Second Congressional District, for the 1950 Census, and he was Democratic chairman of that District in 1951. He

JOHN T. DAMM

John T. Damm, 42, the Democratic candidate for Attorney General, has served as Assistant Prosecutor for Genesee County in 1942, and as Assistant City Attorney and City Attorney for Flint from 1943 through 1950.

He is a member of the law firm of Weiss and Damm in Flint where he has resided since 1941. Prior to that he lived in Mt. Pleasant, where he also practiced law.

Damm, the father of six children, received his pre-law education at Heidelberg College in Ohio, and his law degree from the University of Michigan where he was president of the Lawyers Club and recipient of the Henry M. Campbell Case Club Award.

Damm has served as a member of the Selective Service Appeals Board, and as Genesee County Democratic chairman in 1948-50.
