An article explaining the importance of fuel oil filtration in oil heaters, by Robert Redner of Farmington, appeared in the August issue of the "Master Plumber and Heating Contractor" magazine.

Mr. Redner, a senior mechanical engineering student at Antich College in Yellow Springs, Ohio, is the son of Mr. and Mrs. A. D. Redner of 29845 West Thirteen Mile Road.

Under the college's study-plus-work program, which gives all students at least 90 weeks of regular work experience before they graduate, Redner has spent several job periods as a research engineer with General Filters, Inc., Detroit, where his father is president. His article on oil filters was written as a part of his on-the-job experience.

In special situations, such as Redner's, students are permitted to accumulate some of their college-required work experience on jobs to which they expect to return after graduation.

In his article, Redner points out that many impurities, invisible to the naked eye, which are present in clear-appearing fuel oil, and the importance of the oil filter function in protecting the oil heater from these impurities.

A graduate of the Farmington High School, Layland attended Albion College.

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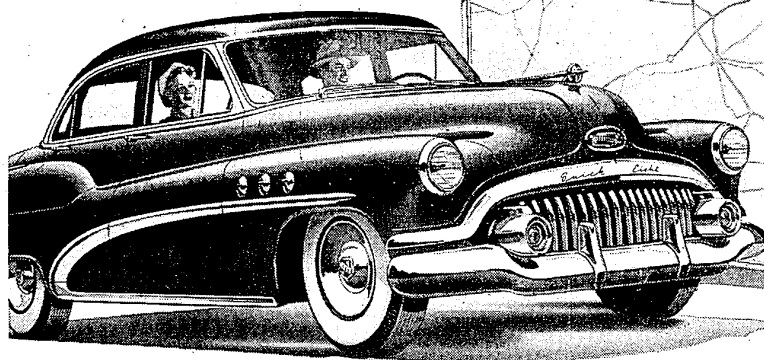
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
