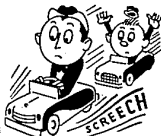

Editorial

Will the citizens of the United States take advantage of their right to vote in this election year? This may seem a strange question to ask, but it is a most vital one. During the past six months our nation has been filled with the excitement of election year: speeches, parades, banquets and splashy newspaper stories. But how much bearing does all this have on the all-important day, November 4? For the fact remains that only 41% of our voting population cast their ballots in the last presidential election. This shows that the American people have forgotten about the preciousness of this right and now take it for granted.

Voting is the act of recording a vote, of giving formal expression of will or opinion in regard to some question submitted for decision, such as enacting laws, passing resolutions or electing local, city, county, state or national officials. It is a privilege given to every American. Of course, there are certain general requirements in all states and they are (1) American citizenship; (2) residence for a certain time in the state, county and election district; (3) that the voter shall have attained his majority (21 years); (4) that the voter shall be of sound mind; and (5) that he shall not be a convicted felon under sentence. Registration is also required in many states.

Now in the early years of our country's existence not every man with the above-mentioned requirements was allowed to vote. During the first part of the 19th century a freeholder qualification was required in many states. But early in the 19th century the freeholder requirement was abolished in nearly every state.

The tax and ownership of personal qualifications disappeared in most states, so that adult male suffrage became the general rule long before the outbreak of the Civil War.

But this was only one half of the American people for the other half was yet denied the right to vote. The other half was the women of America. So they set out to get woman suffrage. They started the National League of Voters which was projected by Mrs. Carrie Chapman Catt. She conducted the first national citizenship school in which women were given the simple rudiments of voting. Soon thousands of schools like this league were started and this league was the first organization to launch a "get-out-the-vote" campaign. Finally in 1920 an amendment was added to the Constitution by Congress giving women the right to vote.

In 1892, New York passed a state law authorizing the use of automatic machines. It had become necessary to have a mechanical device which automatically records and counts the votes. It prevented repeating and other fraud and had great advantages over the paper ballot method, for it was cheaper, simpler, and more rapid.

All these steps were taken so that the people in our land could have a strong hand in running our government and keeping this land a democratic nation. But our citizens have grown lax. Surely if our ancestors struggled to achieve this privilege and fought two world wars to preserve it, then we should honor it. For what would happen if we didn't have it? For instance, "Voting is a privilege, but it is also the duty of every American citizen." M. M.

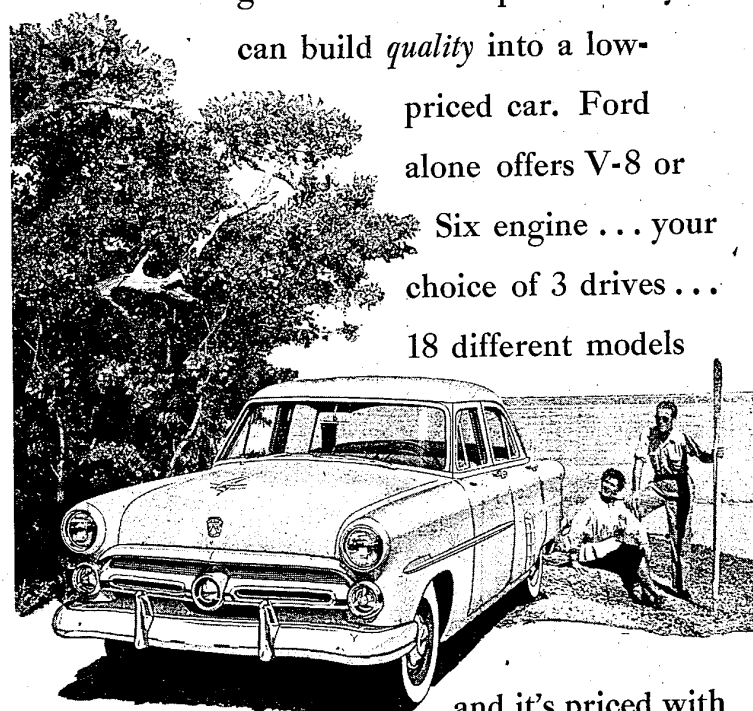
