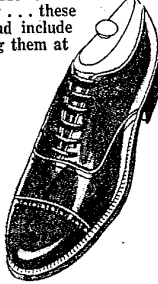

Grand Rapids industries, and Muregon and perhaps Saginaw and the labor bosses have plenty of influence.

Gov. Williams is sympathetic to the CIO to put it mildly. He sees the labor-dominated Legislature as a perfect solution to the impasse that arose when the GOP Legislature consistently opposed his corporation profits tax.

The CIO thinks the plan is swell. They'd like to have the lawmakers sit up to their whiskers.

The CIO's Walter Reuther demonstrated his power this summer when he turned down Alben Barkley as a presidential possibility and approved the draft that named Adlai Stevenson the Democratic standard bearer.

He wouldn't be human if he didn't savor the taste of such power. In national circles he wouldn't be human if it didn't irk him to see his control of the governor go for naught because he can't control the Legislature the same way.

The Republican position, as outlined by Alger, is: "The Legislature should function for all citizens, all sections — not for any special class or area."

Any plan which would make 79 of Michigan's counties controlled by organized minority groups in four counties just couldn't give the state a Legislature that could equitably represent the best interests of Michigan as a whole.

"Watch Those Wires," Company Asks Hunters

The Michigan Bell Telephone Company is again asking hunters to take cognizance of its overhead wires and cables.

With the approach of the 1952 bird season, opening October 20 this year, Michigan Bell again sounded the warning note that serious disruptions in telephone communication can result from careless firing.

"Carelessness with gunfire, and especially deliberate pot-shots at telephone wire insulators, can cut off communication on which a life may depend, or can seriously disrupt vital calls which number high in the normal amount of traffic for our wires and cables carry," a company spokesman said.

Hunters are also reminded that it is against the law to willfully damage telephone facilities by gunfire, an offense which carries a felony charge if the damage exceeds \$50. In most cases, Michigan Bell said, damage by bullet or buckshot usually results in more than a \$50 repair bill for the company.

that the Michigan Farm Bureau should get into the fight. And it's a plenty hard fight facing outside Michigan.

According to the Constitution, the seats of the House and Senate must be reapportioned every ten years. This has to happen in 1953.

There must be some revision: everyone agrees to that. The traditional solution of voting "No" to a puzzling amendment would be a mighty bad way out of the present situation.

The out-state voter must vote NO on Proposal 2 and Yes on Proposal 3 to protect himself from UAW-CIO domination and assure reapportionment on a basis acceptable as equitable through all Michigan's history.

Because it is such a complicated issue, backers of Plan No. 2 will hit on a few major points such as:

The whole Upper Peninsula and four Lower Peninsula counties would have only two Senators;

Fifteen areas will be "geographically" that is, their boundaries will waver and wobble all over the map to make labor unions dominate each voting area;

The plan would destroy the basic American principle that the lower house should be set up to represent population and the upper house to represent areas;

By giving labor the majority voice in the Legislature, union bosses could rewrite the Constitution to suit themselves. Delegates to a Constitutional convention which the Legislature could call, would be selected on the same basis as State Senators are... again with the majority under union domination.

There are only three weeks before the election. Can backers of Plan No. 2 sell the voters on a "Vote No on No. 2; Vote Yes on No. 3" program in those short days?

On their success or failure rides the future of Michigan.

Nothing astonishes men so much as common sense and plain dealing.

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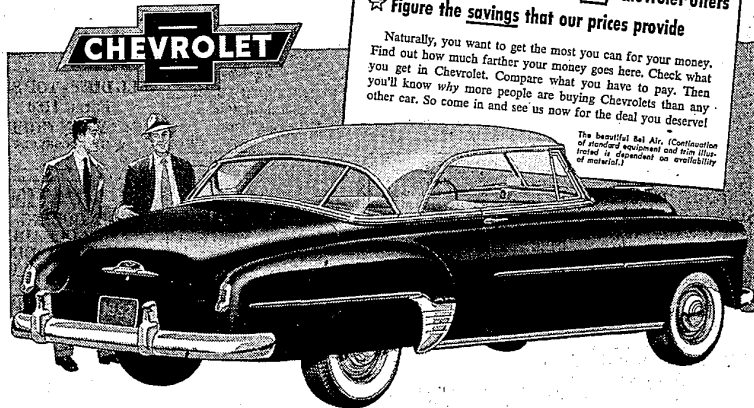
