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Now that the festival is over, we would like to take this time to thank everybody who donated their time and efforts to make the festival the success that it was.

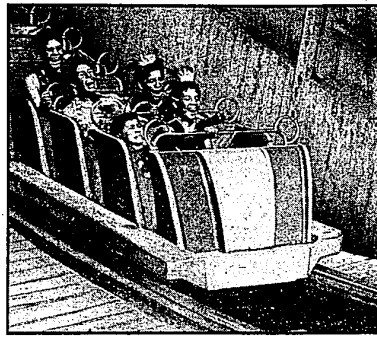

Mayor Arthur G. Law of Pontiac was the guest speaker at the October 1 meeting of the Farmington Women's Club held at the home of Mrs. Florence Lee.

Mayor Law explained the two amendments for reapportionment of the legislative districts of Michigan which will appear on the November 4 ballot. He endorsed Proposal No. 2, which makes populations the sole factor in the redistricting.

RED CROSS SPEAKER TO ISSUE CALL FOR TRAINED WORKERS

American Red Cross and civil defense volunteers and registered nurses can learn next Wednesday, October 15, exactly what to expect if an air raid or other disaster strikes Oakland County. Key roles that such volunteers will play will be detailed at a county-wide meeting at 7:45 p.m. in Longfellow School, Royal Oak. Helen Flanagan of St. Louis, director of disaster nursing in the Midwestern area, American Red Cross, will be the main speaker.

The evening session which will emphasize the need for registered nurses in disaster work is open to anyone interested in community service. The session will follow an afternoon meeting at Oakland County Health Center in Royal Oak for county civil defense officials, American Red Cross leaders and other key disaster people.

Mrs. Hermilio Rodriguez, Jr., of Royal Oak, nurse recruitment chairman for Oakland County Red Cross, is general chairman of the meeting.

Dr. John S. Lambie of Birmingham, medical coordinator for Oakland County Civil Defense, will introduce Miss Flanagan at the afternoon session. Mrs. Mildred Bennett, executive secretary of the county Red Cross chapter, will present Miss Flanagan in the evening.

"We hope everyone realizes how important these meetings are," Mrs. Rodriguez said. "In case of air raid, bad storms or other disaster, which kills and wounds people and leaves them homeless, thousands of lives lie in the hands of first aiders, nurses, civil defense workers and other volunteers."

The evening meeting will take up problems of operating mass shelters for homeless refugees; types of nursing services needed in disaster; and community planning.

"This is part of our regular disaster training program," Mrs. Rodriguez said. "There is only one way we can really prepare for the type of disaster we are apt to have today. That is to have trained corps of volunteers on call, standing ready all the time, knowing what to expect—and exactly what to do."

Men and women with training in social work, psychology or allied fields are urgently needed by Oakland County Chapter, American Red Cross. These trained people who can best carry out the chapter's social welfare aide program are needed to help with home service work as well as with veterans at Dearborn Veterans Hospital.

"People who have this training and aren't tied up steadily now might find this is a good way to keep active in social work," Flanagan, chairman of welfare aides, said this week. "At the same time, they would be helping people who really need it—in a field where training really counts."
