LOCAL STUDENTS GRADUATE FROM NURSING COURSE

Graduation exercises will be held at the Ann Arbor Practical Nurse Education Center today, October 23, at 2:30 p.m. for eighteen students completing the one-year program. This is the seventh class of practical nurse students to graduate since the Ann Arbor Center opened in October, 1947.

The school is one of eight practical nurse schools set up in the State of Michigan under the supervision of the state office of Vocational Education and approved by the Michigan State Board of Nursing. Students completing the course take the State Board of Nursing examination to become licensed practical nurses.

The Ann Arbor school has had an affiliation with the Pontiac General Hospital, where the students held their clinical experience since November of 1950. Six of the present graduating class had their affiliation at Pontiac General, and they are all planning to remain on the staff as graduates. Fourteen other students from Oakland County are in the program at the present time.

Students graduating on Thursday afternoon from Oakland County and vicinity are Mrs. Birdie Blann, Mrs. C. B. Boody, Miss Earline Smith, all from Pontiac; Miss Grace Eddy of Farmington; Miss Nancy Hunsaker, Mt. Morris; and Mrs. Ruby Dease, Detroit.

Miss Mae Edna Doyle, R.N., director of the Ann Arbor Practical Nurse Education Center, stated that the school is now accepting applications for the January 25, 1953, class.

Friends Of Library Cite Needs Here

Farmington should take immediate steps to build up its Public Library, the City Council was told Monday night.

W. Allen Nelson, chairman of the recently organized Farmington Friends of the Library, presented figures to show that, judged by national standards, the present library is grossly inadequate.

"The American Library Association," he said, "considers that a library should stock 2 1/2 volumes for each inhabitant of the area it serves. On the basis of this standard, he presented the following figures to the Council:

The present Farmington Public Library, Mr. Nelson said, has 3,000 volumes, which by national standards is large enough only for a community of 1,200 population.

"This is only one-sixth the number of volumes we should have had in 1940," Mr. Nelson said, "one-eleventh the number needed in 1950 and one-twelfth the number needed now. Further, it is only one-twentieth the number that are likely to be needed in 1960."

Mr. Nelson's figure for the population in 1960 was projected on the basis of growth shown between the 1940 and 1950 censuses — 53.1 per cent in the city and 37.5 per cent in the township. Other bases for projection, he explained, call for a much more rapid growth.

He said that the Friends of the Library, a non-profit organization interested in seeing adequate library facilities established, would be in a position to submit other figures and to offer advice whenever the Council might desire.
