It may be that the Italian violinist will be in the audience along with other notables when Miss June Toth appears as soloist at the concert to be given by the Plymouth Symphony Orchestra at the George H. Fisher School, 10909 Crosley Avenue in the south part of Redford Township on Sunday, November 2, at 4 p.m.

This concert long has been anticipated by many who are aware of Miss Toth's artistic abilities and great talent as a promising young artist.

Her background training has been fitted with honors and exciting experiences, and now her calendar includes a recently awarded scholarship covering a two-year perfection course at the St. Cecilia Conservatory in Rome, where she will study with the head of piano teaching in that school, the Maestro Carlo Zecchi. The scholarship was bestowed through the recommendation of Mr. and Mrs. Mario Nascimbene, and only ten persons are privileged every three years to this honor.

During the summer months, June studied under Rudolph Firkušny at the Aspen Institute of Music in Aspen, Colorado. "She is a graduate of Michigan State College, majoring in music under Dr. Ernest V. Wolf. She won the National Federation of Music Clubs award by winning the State Contest in Detroit, and then the first prize in Indianapolis.

June received her first piano instruction from her mother when she was seven years old. She is apparently living up to the motto she chose for subject matter when she was valedictorian of her class at Farmington High School: "Never Aim Lower Than The Stars."

June will perform Brahms' Piano Concerto in D Minor accompanied by the orchestra under the direction of Wayne Dunlap. The Kenwood Women Club and the Redford Township Chamber of Commerce are among the patrons of the symphony series. According to Mrs. Harold VonBerg, former chairman of the Redford Township Symphony Society, the participation of nearly all the schools in the township sponsoring the concert is expected to bring greater response to the furtherance of good music for the community.

The Plymouth Symphony will stage its second concert in Redford Township on February 1, 1953, when a "Family" type concert will be presented.
