LABOR IGNORES FREE PROGRAMS, DOCTORS CHARGE

Michigan doctors of medicine this week charged labor organizations with failure to take advantage of the free health education programs available to their members through efforts of the medical profession of this state.

This charge was made by the Michigan State Medical Society's representative, Clarence E. Umphrey, M.D., of Detroit, at a regional hearing of the President's Commission on the Health Needs of the Nation. Dr. Umphrey is the immediate past president of the Michigan State Medical Society.

"Regrettably, lay organizations — and we refer to some labor unions as the most previous offenders — have not provided their members with authentic health information which is freely available from the Michigan State Medical Society. Unions have ignored the opportunity of educational services of doctors of medicine and specialized health organizations for their members," Dr. Umphrey said.

Dr. Umphrey also pointed out that the medical profession is constantly engaged in a postgraduate educational program to keep the M.D.s abreast of the latest scientific advances. Because of this, Michigan residents enjoy the highest peak of health in the history of the state, he added.

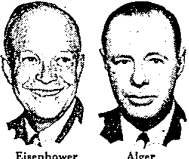


