In the pork line there's some rib end pork loin roasts fer 35c a lb. If yer havin' that yuh can use a few of them apples yuh bought fer apple sauce. Fer beef it's the same old thing — U. S. Choice pot roasts fer 69c a lb. and when yuh git right down to cases what's better than beef — and if yuh git a big enuf roast yuh can always have hash or meat pie later on in the week. Oh — yeah — we got Vlastic butter fer 75c a lb. too — OK??
