Chinese Lecturer Speaks On Asia

"If you could see how hard other young people in other countries have to struggle for survival, you would be ashamed for being so fat and so demoralized," said Dr. No-Yang Park before a student body assembly Tuesday, November 4, at 10:00 a.m. in the gym.

Dr. Park, a Harvard graduate and social studies instructor, spoke on Asia and world problems, and warned that American students should study more about the problems of the East because "The future of the entire world depends on you."

"You live on the topside of heaven that 75% of the other people can't reach, children elsewhere have no time for entertainment or amusements, but instead worry about the source of their next meal."

He went on to compare Asia to a hand, "China is the palm," he said, "and Korea, Indo-China, Burma, etc., are the fingers. These fingers can be controlled only through the palm itself; thus when China collapsed the fingers collapsed. The Korean war resulted as an aftermath of the fall of China and its defenses."

Dr. Park suggested that the only thing to do in Korea and elsewhere now is "to stand united against aggression."

To the question, "If and when there is a truce in Korea, will it be very valuable?" Dr. Park gave an emphatic "No! There will be no lasting peace until there is some form of world order created to preserve the principles of justice."

The second Inter-Lakes Student Council meeting was held November 3 at Berkley.

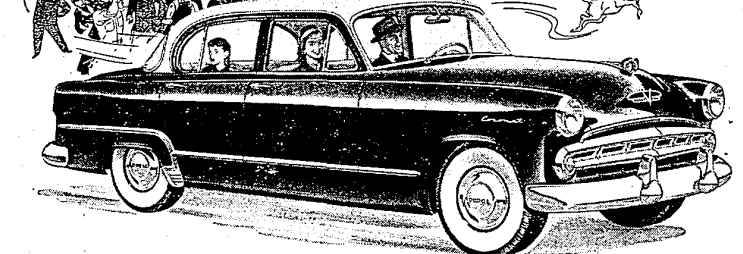
The meeting was conducted by vice-president Don Schoenheit of Berkley in the absence of president Jack Cowart from Farmington.
