GRADES OF APPLES

Do you know what apple grades are? U. S. Fancy apples are perfect with high color; U. S. No. 1 grade apples are perfect with 10 per cent color or better, report Michigan State College home economists. U. S. No. 2 are perfect apples with no color requirements while U. S. Utility grade has defects that do not speed up decay. Utility grade is often called "orchard run".
