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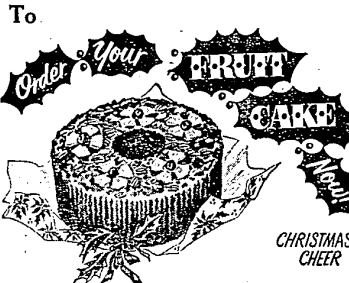

He will also give an address on "Creative Publishing" at the Book Fair to be held at the Detroit Jewish Community Center. He will, however, reserve time for authors who have written book manuscripts. Appointments with him may be made through the New York offices of Exposition Press, 386 Fourth Avenue, New York 16, through November 26; or at the Statler Hotel in Detroit November 28, 29 and 30.
