## EXPECT RECORD KILL TO LIGHTEN HERD HEALTH PROBLEM

Michigan hunters are expected to harvest 250,000 deer from the present one million-size herd before November 30. This would be the biggest kill ever registered during this century, but still below what game men say is necessary for best herd and range improvement.

Last year, about average during the last ten years, 365,000 hunters took 194,000 bucks.

Herd health is poor in some areas of the state, notably the northern lower peninsula, where overbreeding has killed much range and lack of food has stunted the animals. Fawn production rates and checks of deer killed illegally and by autos during the year show upper peninsula deer more healthy than those of the northern lower peninsula deer most healthy of all.

The special three-day "any deer" portion at the end of the northern lower peninsula season was constructed to check malnutrition in that area. Most of the increase in hunter numbers and kill is expected in that area during those three days.

## Trojans Drop Final Grid Game

The Clarencville Trojans ended the season's football schedule by bowing to Clarkson 21-14 Friday, November 14, before a large home crowd at Redford Union field. The game, which proved to be close and exciting, featured great defensive play on the part of both teams in the first half.

Clarkson threatened to score early in the first quarter after receiving the Trojan kick-off on their own 20-yard stripe. They drove 60 yards before the Trojan defense was able to halt them 17 yards from pay dirt. Neither team was able to score in the remaining part of the first quarter, as both defenses rose to the occasion.

The teams exchanged punts in the early stages of the second quarter, as neither team could spark a drive. Then, late in the quarter, the Trojans halted Clarkson on their own 34 and took possession of the ball. The Trojans quickly took to the air with Killean completing a pass to Gilmore that netted 40 yards and brought the ball down to Clarkson's 30 yard stripe. A series of ground plays climaxed by a 20-yard pass from Killean to Robbins in the end zone resulted in the first tally of the game. Evans converted and the Trojans were off to a 7-0 lead.

The half ended with Clarkson penetrating deep into Trojan territory.

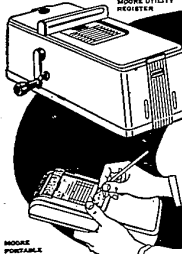
