

State Makes Revisions In Trout Lake Listings

Five lakes have been added to and 11 lakes removed from the conservation department's list of designated trout lakes for 1953.

Certain waters each year are listed as "trout lakes" where all fishing is prohibited except during trout season.

The 1953 fish law digest, slated for publication in December, will carry the complete list of designated trout lakes.

Additions for 1953 are Grants, Hiko and Rock Lakes, Alger County, and Rock and Tilden Lakes in Marquette County.

Lakes removed from the list and now open to other types of fishing are Dead, Grand Marais, Mellen and Legion (Pine) Lakes in Alger County; Towlino Lake, Charlevoix County; Lost Lake, Oscoda County; Long Lake, Iron County; Manganese Lake, Keweenaw County; Musgrave Lake, Luce County; and Little Trout Lake in Marquette County.

Also, Burke Lake in Clinton County has been changed from a trout lake to a "special trout wishing pond" with special regulations set up to cover fishing there.

FEEDER LAMBS Start lambs on feed slowly to avoid digestive upsets and losses, advises L. H. Blakeslee, Michigan College sheep researcher. Use good legume hay or one-tenth pound daily of soybean oil meal with farm grains. Add protein and calcium if feeding silage and be careful of self-feeding, especially in the corn field.
