Says Strawberry Mulch Should Be Applied Now

It's about time to mulch those strawberries! They should have been covered around November 15, but a week or so will not do any particular damage unless we get unseasonably cold weather.

The reasons for mulching are to protect the plants from winter injury, to protect them from alternate freezing and thawing, to consume moisture, smother weeds and to keep the berries clean during the fruiting season. The protection from winter injury and alternate thawing and freezing are the most important.

Wheat, oat or rye straw is most commonly used. This should be as free from weed seeds as possible, usually straw over a year old on the outer edges of a stock is more free of weed seeds. An excellent material which is almost entirely free of weed seeds is March hay.

MSC Economists Report Outlook Good For Dairy Farming In 1953

Dairy farming will enjoy a more favorable position in 1953, in relation to other Michigan agriculture, than it has in recent years, agree Michigan State College agricultural economists.

The present favorable milk-feed price relation will continue through 1953, expect Dale E. Butz, extension specialist, and C. Raymond Foglund, research specialist in agricultural economics. Less favorable hog and beef prices have checked the downward trend in dairy cow numbers.

A few more cows and higher production will mean more milk.

COUNTY AGENT GIVES OUTLOOK FOR WHEAT CROP

Many farmers have called or contacted the County Agent, Ed Alchin, regarding the wheat outlook, with the drought that has been prevalent to Oakland County — in fact, through most of the state. Some comments that he would like to make along this line are as follows: First of all, if the wheat isn't there, obviously there won't be a crop. (2) Good rootings and fair top growth are important for wheat to winter over without damage. Apparently there hasn't been, in many cases, satisfactory development along this line. (3) Wheat that hasn't sprouted or partially sprouted will certainly not grow to make a crop next year.

What's to do about this? There is no particular reason for taking action this fall. His advice to farmers is to wait until warm weather comes next spring and hope ample rains will come, then to help determine what to do.

A definite decision should be made by the middle or latter part of April as to whether or not a stand of the wheat crop is satisfactory. If it is decided that the crop is not satisfactory, then planting of oats or corn after diskings the field might be done.

As far as the general crop prospects for wheat this fall, from observation, it looks like about 50% of the fields stand a chance next spring. Hope for the best, but it is expected now that the Oakland County wheat crop will be off 20 to 40% from the normal next year.

FARMINGTON MAN NAMED DIRECTOR OF M. M. P. A.

At a recent meeting of the Michigan Milk Producers Association Ward Eagle of Farmington was elected as a director of the Association for a term of three years.

Named along with Eagle for the same office were William Brister, Flat Rock; Clay Croll of Britton and Theodore Laursen of Marlette.

The meeting was addressed by Dr. Clifford M. Hardin, acting Dean of Agriculture at Michigan State College, who told delegates of the work being done by the Extension Department in helping to raise the standards of dairy cattle in the state as well as provide a better quality of milk for the consumers.

Dr. C. L. Anspach, president of Central Michigan College of Education, was the guest speaker of the day.

More than one and a half billion pounds of milk with a value of almost \$75 million were marketed during the year ending September 30 by the Michigan Milk Producers Association, representing a money increase of 15 percent over the previous year for the state's dairy farmers who are members of the organization. This fact was set forth in the report of secretary-manager Howard F. Simmons to some 400 delegates, representing 16,000 members, attending the 36th annual meeting of the producers association held in Fairchild Theater on the campus at East Lansing.

In his message to the delegates, President I. K. Maystend pointed out that milk consumption continues to increase steadily while production is on the decline.

Demand will be strong for fluid milk and ice cream and less of the supply will go into butter. The unexported and condensed milk market will be stronger. Butter consumption — nine pounds per capita in 1952 — probably will be less. The spread between margarine and butter prices has continued to widen. The non-fat dry milk solid market is expanding with new consumer packages.

GASSING THE SOIL

Anhydrous ammonia is ammonia gas handled in liquid form under high pressure, explains Paul J. Root, extension soil scientist at Michigan State College.

When pressure is released, the liquid changes to gas. When injected at least four inches deep in soil and covered, the ammonia readily combines with soil as fertilizer, he notes.
