Cite Aid of Papers In Agricultural Areas

Weekly and other newspaper editors who lead the way through barnyard and field to help bring more prosperous farming to their areas drew high praise recently at Michigan State College.

Michigan editors of papers with rural and small-town readers closed their Rural Life Editorial Conference hearing Max N. Beeler, agricultural counselor for Capper Publications, Inc., Topeka, Kansas.

Beeler singled out one Michigan weekly as among the top ones in the nation in helping make broad-based agriculture thrive. He noted that the Myers family, publishers of the Lapeer County Press, were examples of the better weekly owners in Michigan. Today, the people in the county seat don't know much more about agriculture than those in Detroit unless the weekly editors bring them this understanding, noted Beeler.

Mr. Beeler likes to see weeklies do the job many of them are doing in Michigan. They can show their weight behind pasture improvement, water for stock and other uses, introduction of better hybrid corn varieties, poultry and beef improvement, said Beeler. Diversified farming, home fruit gardens, bigger farm output, winter cover crops, soil and water conservation and other projects the weeklies help push make for balanced farming and better living, noted the agricultural reporter.
