National Board Amends General Wage Regulation

The National Wage Stabilization Board has issued an amendment to General Wage Regulation 14 to permit payment of a 1952 Christmas bonus not to exceed \$40.00 per employee without offset against any amount permissible under any other Wage Board regulation or resolution, it was announced this week by M. S. Ryder, Michigan regional WSB chairman.

Text of the amendment is as follows:

"Section 5(D) of General Wage Regulation 14, as amended, is hereby further amended to read as follows:

(B) Any employer, without prior Board approval, may pay any of his employees a 1952 Christmas or year-end bonus either in cash or in kind not exceeding \$40.00 in value, even though a lesser bonus or no bonus was paid in the preceding bonus year. Such bonus payments need not be offset against the amount permissible under any other regulation or resolution. If a Christmas or year-end bonus greater than \$40.00 was paid in the preceding bonus year, such bonus may continue to be paid subject to the provisions of this Regulation."

ANNUAL MICHIGAN ART EXHIBITION NOW SHOWING

The 43rd annual Michigan Artists Exhibition opened at the Detroit Institute of Arts Tuesday, November 18, at 8:00 p.m. and will continue through December 21.

There are 60 pieces of sculpture in this year's show, a larger number than ever before, 133 oil paintings and 70 water colors. This is a total of 263 works by 210 artists selected from approximately 1600 entries.

Those from the Farmington area having entries are Annie Gulen, 34004 W. Seven Mile Road, who is showing "Night Skating", an oil, and Hugh McNeil, 33174 Alta Loma, who has on display a water color "Mexican Laundry".

The jury which selected the exhibition was composed of Philip R. Adams, director of the Cincinnati Art Museum, and Aaron Bohrod, one of the country's best known artists and a member of the faculty of the University of Wisconsin as "artist in residence". They described the exhibition as "extremely diverse" and "able to hold its own with anything on the national scene."
