### REAL FOOD COST HAS DECLINED, SAYS ECONOMIST

When the housewife leaves the grocery store with the impression that all food prices are high, she isn't taking prices of canned foods into account.

Low prices of canned fruits and vegetables have risen, but not as much as the prices of other foods nor as much as average income, with the result that the housewife today can buy more than twice the amount of canned foods with average weekly earnings than she could have purchased 30 years ago.

So stated Carlos Campbell, an economist, secretary of the National Canners Association, Washington, D. C., in a principal address at the fall meeting of the Michigan Canners Association.

He pointed out that "the real cost of canned foods to the consumer not only has not advanced but actually has declined since 1920, while other wild animals will take additional time.

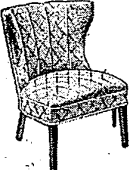

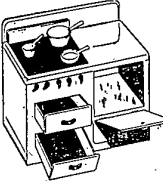
