

Asia Calls To Peace Corpsman

FARMINGTON Like most teachers, sociologist Mark S. Gaylord of Farmington, wants his students to learn as much as they can from him - but not without giving him a more difficult time in class.

Gaylord, 27, is a Peace Corps volunteer teaching at Malaysia's MARA Institute of Technology (MIT), a rapidly growing institution of higher education in this developing southeast Asian nation.

His wife Diann, 26, of Charlevoix, is a former teacher in the Detroit, Petoskey and St. Clair Shores public schools. They have been serving on the MIT faculty since January.

Both will teach as Peace Corps volunteers for two years to help the institution meet its need for qualified academic manpower during a period of rising student enrollment.

Gaylord, who interrupted his doctoral studies in sociology at the University of California at Santa Barbara to join the Peace Corps, teaches sociology to students from MIT's schools of mass communication, library science, and business and management.

He finds his students open friendly and responsive - but reluctant to ask questions in class or cross-examine their teacher.

"They're not as sophisticated as American students," said Gaylord. "They don't have a strong educational background, and they're not used to asking questions."

"You have to pull questions from them," he said. "They're not used to challenging a teacher."

The students' reluctance to engage in classroom give-and-take with Gaylord and other teachers is largely a product of Malaysia's British-influenced formal education system. In the traditional primary or secondary school classroom the teacher is master. Students learn by rote memorization and rarely challenge or question their instructors for more information.

Gaylord conducts his classes differently, encour-

aging lively discussions and drawing questions and observations from his students.

Because his students show great interest in the United States, he frequently compares and contrasts the American and Malaysian social systems and ways of life in his introductory sociology courses. Mrs. Gaylord, an English teacher at MIT, follows through by conducting tutorial sessions in sociology for small groups of her husband's students.

Mr. and Mrs. Gaylord are both graduates of Central Michigan University in Mt. Pleasant, where he majored in psychology and she majored in secondary education.

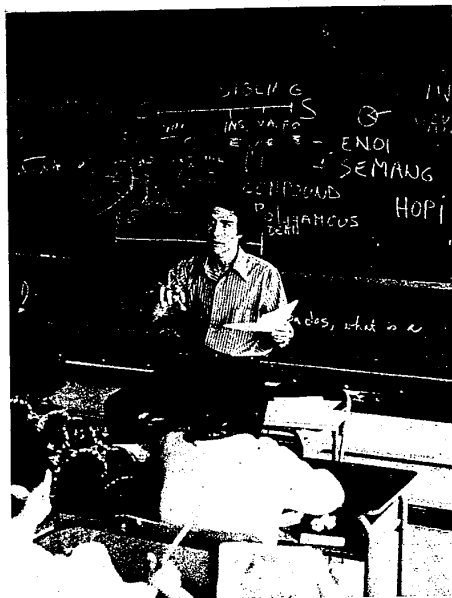
Gaylord received his master's degree in sociology from Wayne State University in 1971. He studied for a year toward his PhD degree at the University of California at Santa Barbara before taking a leave of absence to join the Peace Corps.

Mrs. Gaylord taught art at Burroughs Junior High School in Detroit for a year after her graduation, and then returned to school at Wayne State University to earn an elementary teaching certificate.

She taught first grade classes for a year each in St. Clair Shores and Petoskey before moving to California. Before joining the Peace Corps she was an assistant director of the Small World Child Care Center in Goleta, Calif.

The Gaylords arrived in Malaysia in October 1972 and began their teaching assignments in January, following intensive Peace Corps training in Bahasa Malaysia, the national language, and Malaysian history and cross-cultural studies.

Gaylord is attached to MIT's school of mass communication, a brand new school opened last year to

train young Malaysian high school graduates for careers in journalism, public relations and advertising in a four-year program.

Gaylord teaches introductory sociology to 26 mass communication students, and provides a similar course to 18 students in MIT's school of library science. He also teaches a seminar in transport sociology for five advanced students in the school of business and management.

Mrs. Gaylord is affiliated with the school of library science faculty.

Besides conducting tutorials for her husband's sociology students, she teaches English and literature to first-year library science students. Because of her experience in elementary education, she is also planning

to serve as a volunteer elementary school teacher the two days a week she does not have classes at MIT.

The Gaylords live in a spacious modern house provided by MIT on its main campus at Shah Alam outside of Kuala Lumpur, capital of Malaysia. The campus is the scene of a massive building program being undertaken by MARA to increase the institution's enrollment and facilities.

MARA, or Majlis Amanah Raya, is a development institution devoted to assisting and training predominantly rural Malays and other indigenous people of Malaysia.

While the Malays are the largest single ethnic group in multi-racial Malaysia, the country's predominantly urban Chinese citizens are more active in trade, busi-

ness and finance and dominate much of the country's economy.

To help the Malays achieve wider participation in the country's economic life, MARA offers numerous technical assistance, credit and training programs. MIT is the most advanced of its training facilities, with 12 schools, 49 different courses, and an enrollment of about 3,700 students expected to expand to 4,300 by the end of this year.

Born and raised in Farmington, Gaylord is the son of Mrs. Lorraine L. Gaylord of 31839 Kingswood Square.

The Gaylords are among 340 Peace Corps volunteers serving in Malaysia in a wide variety of education, technical training, health, community development, agriculture and other programs.
